The Centre for Internet and Society (CIS) is a ten year old non-profit organization with offices in Bengaluru and New Delhi, that undertakes interdisciplinary policy and academic research on internet and digital technologies. Our team works across our research areas, which include: Accessibility for persons with disabilities, access to knowledge, openness (including open data, free and open source software, open standards, open access, open educational resources, and open content), internet governance (including free speech, privacy, artificial intelligence, big data, cyber security, and future of work), telecommunication, and Researchers at Work [RAW].

Theory of Change

In the first near decade of our existence, the CIS was following what is known as the classic theory of change¹ for policy research organisations. One, identification of upcoming policy windows. Two, production of evidence based research targeted at these windows. Three, dissemination of research resulting in the 'inside track'² - through an invitation to join a government or multi-stakeholder committee with the potential to influence law, policy and/or practice. Alternatively, if inside track is not feasible and if the issue has popular appeal, the next step is to disseminate our research in with the aim of creating public debate and serving the ongoing research needs of campaigns by advocacy organisations. Another alternative when there is no potential for campaigning or advocacy, is to leverage our research through public engagement by researchers at CIS directly via TV appearances, newspaper columns, op-eds, media coverage and social media engagement. This is done with the aim of driving policy makers to take stock of our findings and adopt our recommendations even if we are not directly engaging with policymaking.

In reality however, there was another theory of change also at play. Having been established nine years ago, CIS was responsible for the creation of a field in India. As a research organisation, we hold resolute commitment to the notion that "nobody has monopoly over the truth". We also take a reflexive approach to dealing with dogma, with an almost unfailing resolution not to take institutional positions - allowing us to work with equal ease with activists and industry. Rather than resulting in incapacitating relativism, it has led us to ask some of the toughest questions to the most powerful actors across a range of fields and institutional positions. Unlike organizations that take a hard stance, we are always willing to "falsify existing truth claims" - even our own, constantly opening up research opportunities.

More recently, thanks to two editions of the Internet Researcher Conference, we have begun to formalize our role in producing high quality debate. This individual and institutional view provides an alternative account of our history. Three of our fellows — Malavika Jayaram, Anja Kovacs, and Chinmayi Arun — have founded three civil society organisations in the space of research on technology, namely Digital Asia Hub, Internet Democracy Project and the Centre for Communication Governance at the National Law University, Delhi. We have provided incubation services to many communities, including the Wikimedia India Chapter, Datameet [India's largest open data community], Random Hacks of Kindness, Pyladies, etc. and social enterprises like Inclusive Planet and HasGeek. The very first Bitcoin community meeting in India was held at CIS in 2013. Founding directors like Pranesh and Nirmita have respectively gotten recognition from Forbes [30 under 30] magazine and citations from the President of India. We also run the largest internship programme in this space with around 50 interns per year coming primarily from law schools in India. and foreign universities like Princeton and University of Toronto, along with a mix of students from engineering, the humanities, and social sciences. Many of our excolleagues, consultants and interns have gone onto join the industry and other civil society organizations and think tanks.

Directors

Sunil Abraham



Sunil is the Executive Director of CIS. He is also a social entrepreneur and Free Software advocate. He founded Mahiti in 1998 which aims to reduce the cost and complexity of Information and Communication Technology for the Voluntary Sector by using Free Software. Today, Mahiti employs more than 50 engineers and Sunil continues to serve on the board as a board member. Sunil was elected an Ashoka fellow in 1999 to 'explore the democratic

potential of the Internet' and was granted a Sarai FLOSS fellowship in 2003. Between June 2004 and June 2007, he managed the International Open Source Network, a project of the UNDP's Asia-Pacific Development Information Programme serving 42 countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Between September 2007 and June 2008, he also managed ENRAP, an electronic network of International Fund for Agricultural Development projects in the Asia-Pacific facilitated and co-funded by International Development Research Centre, Canada.

Elonnai is Chief Operating Officer at the CIS. Elonnai has graduated from the University of Toronto where she studied international development and political science. 







Highlights for 2017-18

The Ministry of Electronics & Information Technology. Government of India published the Guidelines for Indian Government Websites (GIGW). Nirmita Narasimhan on behalf of the Centre for Internet & Society gave comments on GIGW.

> CIS submitted its comments on mobile accessibility guidelines to the Ministry of Electronics & IT, Govt. of India.

The 34th session of the Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights (SCCR) was held in Geneva from May 1 to 5, 2017. Anubha Sinha participated in the event and a summary report is available here. She made statements on behalf of CIS on the Discussion on **Limitations and Exceptions** for Libraries and Archives and on the Proposal for Analysis of Copyright Related to the Digital Environment.

CIS made a submission to the Department of Industrial Planning and Promotion on mobile patents. CIS offered its assistance on matters aimed at developing a suitable policy framework for SEPs and FRAND in India, and, working towards sustained innovation, manufacture and availability of mobile technologies in India.

CIS, Wikimedia Foundation, Wikimedia India and other affiliates of India initiated **Chromebook for the Project** Tiger to enable writers from various Indic languages to create quality content in Indic languages. The project will also help Wikipedia editors by supporting them with internet charges for 6 months and laptops to 50 volunteers to address content gaps.

The paper titled "Patent Working **Requirements and Complex** Products" has been published in the latest issue of the NYU Journal of Intellectual Property and Entertainment Law. It is one of the outputs of the Pervasive Technology project and has been authored by Prof. Jorge L. Contreras, Rohini Lakshané, and Paxton M. Lewis.

> Anubha Sinha took part in the 35th Session of the World Intellectual Property Organization ("WIPO") Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights ("SCCR") at Geneva from 13 November, 2017 to 18 November, 2017. She posed a question on the agenda 'Other Matters' on behalf of CIS on Day 5, 17 November, 2017. CIS also gave statements on Limitations and Exceptions for Libraries and Archives and GRULAC Proposal for Analysis of Copyright in the Digital Environment.

CIS-A2K signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Telangana Government's IT, Electronics & **Communications Department** with to catalyse the development of the Wikimedia movement in Telangana and improve the state of free-licensed digital content in Telugu and Urdu.

> CIS compiled a report that highlighted four government projects run by various government departments that have made sensitive personal financial information and Aadhaar numbers public on the project websites.

CIS made a submission on the 'White Paper of the Committee of Experts on a Data Protection Framework for India' ("White Paper") released by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology.

CIS made a submission to TRAI Consultation on inputs to the National Telecom Policy. CIS in its submission also recommended what all should be the main objectives of TRAI while drafting the next edition of National Telecom Policy.

Under a research grant from the Azim Premji University CIS has initiated a study of the ongoing updation process of the National Register of Citizens (NRC) in Assam and the resultant reform of citizen identification infrastructure in India.

In an initial literature survey CIS has focused on how scholars in a diversity of fields, ranging from Information Science and Science and Technology Studies to Anthropology and Political Science, have engaged with how state infrastructures mediate the state-citizen relationship.

CIS has collaborated with LabEx ICCA (Université Paris 13), UNESCO New Delhi, Centre for Social Sciences and Humanities (CSH), and Centre d'études de l'Inde et de l'Asie du Sud (CEIAS), to organise a Research Symposium on Digital Transitions in Cultural and Creative Industries in India. The symposium gathers researchers and practitioners engaging with the changing landscape of cultural and creative industries in India in the context of the rapid expansion of digital technologies and social media.







Copyright and Patent

CIS participated at two meetings of WIPO Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights, where we made statements to advance users' rights broadly in the domain of broadcasting rights and limitations and exceptions.

CIS made submissions to improve transparency of the Indian patent system by requesting the Indian Patent Office to implement existing provisions pertaining to working of patents, and published an empirical study of patent working disclosures in the Indian mobile device sector. Further, we made submissions to the TRAI on the issue of licensing of standard essential patents.

Pervasive Technologies

Researchers at CIS and Prof. Hong Xue of Beijing Normal University have written eight chapters under the Pervasive Technologies project. Specifically, CIS' empirical research drew the attention of both government and industry. Our findings in the study on patenting of mobile phone technologies were cited in a government issued consultation paper on telecom industry, and industry leaders such as Microsoft and Qualcomm entered into discussions with us on the issue of patent licensing in the mobile device manufacturing industry. Privacy

The year 2017-18 was very significant for privacy and data protection developments in India. The Supreme Court began and completed hearings to determine its position on the status of right to privacy as a fundamental right, and ruled emphatically and unanimously in favour of the right. We competed actively on the process and wrote a series of short papers explaining the sources, structure and scope of the right to privacy under the Puttaswamy judgment. The year was also significant as a Committee of Experts was set up to provide recommendations for the data protection law in India. We published a report exploring how privacy principles need to be rethought and articulated for India's data protection law. We also analysed several global developments around privacy law, including the GDPR and structure of data protection in different countries. Finally, CIS organised a national round table on privacy which was very well received, and participated in several domestic and international events and discussions on privacy.





In the sectoral approach which is followed in the US data protection is regulated on a sector-to-sector basis. Different industries have different regulation, and some areas are not regulated at all. Public and private sectors are regulated by different statutes.



On the other hand, the omnibus approach of the EU means that a single law protects personal data in all industries and most contexts. A single comprehensive data protection statute can cover the private and public sector both.

Freedom of Expression

70% of all shutdowns in the world occurred in India in 2017 and with such a number, it is not hard to see why majority of our work in the freedom of speech and expression domain centred around raising awareness for these shutdowns as well as highlighting concerns of different regions grappling with this issue. Territorially, we focused on the areas of Kashmir, Darjeeling along with analysing the different international legal frameworks pertaining to shutdowns. Broadly speaking, we looked at how the Internet was being used by individuals to further their profession, communication, tourism and education. At ICANN we continued to campaign for great financial disclosure and better accountability mechanisms and we attended the IGF where we spoke on incorporating human rights in cybersecurity strategies, artificial intelligence in Asia and challenges to internet governance.

The researchers@work, or r@w, programme at the Centre for Internet and Society is a multidisciplinary research initiative driven by contemporary concerns to understand the reconfiguration of social processes and structures through the internet and digital media technologies, and vice versa. We are interested in producing local and contextual accounts of interactions, negotiations, and resolutions between the internet and socio-material and geo-political structures.

During 2017-2018, we produced a set of memos on management of Intellectual property rights and digital archiving practices for the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts to support the ongoing National Cultural Audiovisual Archive project being led by the same; initiated two new projects that respectively focus on the ongoing National Register of Citizens process in Assam (supported by a research grant from Azim Premji University) and on documenting, analysing, and informing Big Data for Development research and implementation initiatives in the global south, as part of a newly established global network (supported by the International Development Research Centre, Canada); and organised the third edition of the Internet Researchers' Conference in February 2018, which was conceptualised around the thematic of 'offline'.

ANNEXURE

1. Financial Irregularities

- a. During the financial year 2014-15, the management of the Society had identified misappropriation of funds alleged to have been committed by an employee in charge of finance and accounts function at the Society. The employment contract with this individual has been terminated in 201.5. Further the Board has also conducted a forensic investigation of the financial irregularities with the assistance of external consultants M/s. Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu India LP.
- b. The management of the Society believes that. identified/ required adjustments and disclosures arising from the financial irregularities pertaining to the above, to the extent of the information available with the management, had been made in financial statements of financial year 2014-15. The management updates the status of the misappropriation case at each reporting period. As conformed by the management, based on the information available with the society, no adjustment is required to be made in the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018.
- c. According to the information and explanations given to us, during the financial year 2015-16 and 2016-17 the management had explored an out of court settlement with the ex-employee alleged of the misappropriation. As informed, there is no progress in the out of court process and the Board has now decided in their meeting held on 31 March 2018 to file a legal suit against the exemployee. The Society is in the process of filing the lawsuit as on the date of this report.
- d. In view of the above, we are unable to comment on the adjustments/disclosures which are necessary as a result of further findings of the ongoing judicial proceedings/ investigations and the consequential impact, if any on these financial statements.

2. Advance Recoverable Suspense

Advance recoverable suspense of ₹14,63,998/- represent amount suspected to have been misappropriated by the employee who was in charge of finance and accounting functions during the financial years 2013-2014 and 2014-2015. As stated above in pant (1), the Society is in the process of filing a lawsuit against the said ex-employee. Considering these facts we are of the opinion that the balance is doubtful of recovery and provision needs to be created for the same.

3. **Undisbursed funds** (Note 2 to the financial statements)

- a. The balance of undisbursed funds ₹2,71,54,099/- (net of excess applied amounting to ₹19,55,917/-) as at 31 March 2018 is subject to confirmation by the donors.
- b. The excess applied amount of ₹19,55,917/- (Refer note 2 to the financial statements for donor wise break up) represent cases wherein the expenditure incurred by the Society on the specific projects have exceeded the grant received from the specific donors. Such expenditure is incurred from internal accruals and other grant receipts.

4. Write of/ Write back of project balances

During the year the Society has recognized the unspent amount of specific grants amounting to ₹38,89,303/- as income in 'Income and Expenditure account'. The project wise details are as follows:

the said financial year. In our opinion, in the absence of a refund due confirmed by the Assessment Order, the TDS receivable is doubtful of recovery and needs to be written off in the books.

Note: Advance recoverable suspense represent amounts suspected to have been misappropriated by one of its employees who was in charge of finance and accounting function during the FYs 2013-14 and 2014-15.

During the Financial Year 2015-16, the Management attempted for an out-of-court settlement with the alleged suspect which did not yield the desired results. The management is now actively pursuing its legal options against the alleged suspect and is confident of recovering the entire amount. Accordingly the entire advance recoverable suspense is considered as good and recoverable as at March 31, 2018. During the year 2015-16, management performed a reconciliation of the expenses incurred towards Hans Foundation project as recorded in the books of account with the utilization statements submitted to the donor from the beginning of the project upto financial year 2015-16. The management observed that an amount of ₹71,93,321/- was overbooked in the books of account towards the project in earlier

years i.e. 2013-14 and 2014-15, which is also attributable to the misappropriation of funds by the aforesaid employee. The Board during their meeting held on 27 March 2017 discussed and decided to write off/ adjust the difference of ₹71,93,321/- and accordingly the same has been written off during the financial year 2015-16.

(a) During the financial year 2016-17 the management identified that, on account of certain mismatches in TDS returns filed by the Society in earlier years, the tax statement extracted from Income-tax website showed a TDS of ₹8,82,220/- as payable by the Society. During the year the Society reconciled certain balances and reduced the TDS mismatch to ₹2,63,220/-. The Management is in the process of reconciling the balance amount and is confident that the mismatch with be reconciled and no liability will accrue to the Society on account of this.

Schedule 10

Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis for preparation of financial statements

The Financial Statements of the Society, consisting of Balance Sheet, Receipts & Payments Account and Income & Expenditure Account, are prepared by the Society under historical cost convention, on cash basis of accounting. In the absence of any authoritatively established accounting principles for the specialised aspects related to Societies which do not carry out any commercial activity, the statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies as described below.

(b) Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost. Fixed assets purchased towards specific projects are accounted based on fund accounting system. The purchase of fixed assets are recorded as utilisation in the respective fund.

(c) Donations and grants

Donations and grants received are recognised as income on receipt of such donation. Donations made with a specific direction that they shall form part of the corpus of the Trust are classified as corpus donations and are directly accounted as society fund receipts in the Balance Sheet.

Grants received from donors which are earmarked with specific budget (specific grants) are accounted based on fund accounting system. The receipts and payments pertaining to the specific fund is accounted in the fund account and the unutilized amount is shown as a liability. Salary cost is allocated to the specific project based on the time spent on specific project estimated on reasonable basis in line with the budget agreed with the donors. Administration and other common expenses are apportioned to the projects to the extent allowable as per the MOU's agreed with the donors.

Unspent amount, if any, at the end of the project period will be returned to the donors if so required by the MOU agreed with the donors, or adjusted against Reserves in the absence of instructions from the donors to the contrary.

(d) Reimbursement of expenses

Expenses incurred by the Society which are reimbursed by the donors, are recognized as expenses on actual payment. The reimbursement received from the donors is recognized as income on actual receipt of the amount. Any amount reimbursed in excess of the actual expenses incurred is considered as income and recognized accordingly in the Income & Expenditure account.
